


An introduction to Looking for work if you are disabled





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Introduction



Applying for a job can be hard if you have a disability or long-term health condition.



This can be a cause of worry for some people.

However, there is support available to make it easier and help you apply for a job.



Access to Work



Access to Work is support you can get from the Department for Work and Pensions.



This could include money known as a grant.

You would not have to pay the money back.



If your disability makes it difficult for you to do certain types of work, you can get extra support.



For example, we can support you to:

- Travel to work
- Answer questions at an interview
- Get special equipment to make your job easier.


When looking for a job
